As to your book I have been to one
of the largest publishing houses here,
Scribners, and they could not handle
it, several other publishers would not
pass judgement on it until they saw
an English translation of it and at the
present time I can hardly travel to it
as I start away on a three months
propaganda tour in two weeks, still
there is a Comrade in Boston who I will
see about translating it and then try
again.

What effect did the death of the
Canovas del Castillo have on the general

public in France, here in America it
created a big sensation and it is safe
to say that Anarchism has not been
talked about by the newspapers and
public at large since 1886 & 87 as during
the first 10 days, pages of the daily
press have been taken up by a descrip-
tion of the tortures and while all of the
American newspapers have admitted
that Canova was a monster, still when
we held our meeting to celebrate the
event on Monday night we were denoun-
ced as glorifying murder, the New York
Journal the most sensational paper
in American daily papers, had some
remarkable Editorials on the subject, which
could hardly have been improved on by
Anarchists, yet they turned tail when we
had our meeting and denounced us in
the most bitter terms, hypocrisy of the
press is one of the features of American
Journalism.
